Arresting Images Update by Jeanie Tummon

Launched during the OPP's 100th Anniversary at the Art Gallery of Peel on 31 May 2009, **Arresting Images** continues to travel across the province. **Arresting Images** is currently featured at Simcoe County Museum until 14 September, and it will be at Guelph Civic Museum from 8 October until 10 December 2009.

Arresting Images features 100 historic mug shots from The OPP Museum's permanent collection, dating from 1886 to 1908. This is the first time that these images have been presented for public display since first collected by the Ontario Police, precursors of today's Ontario Provincial Police, at Niagara Falls.

Visitors to **Arresting Images** have the rare opportunity to gaze directly into the eyes of people arrested over 100 years ago - pickpockets, confidence men, escaped fugitives, shoplifters, horse thieves and even murderers, all compelling, fascinating and thought-provoking images. The stories of the individuals arrested, the officers who arrested them, and the period in which they lived are all part of the rich heritage of the Ontario Provincial Police. **Arresting Images** is one of a number of innovative OPP Museum 100th Anniversary projects. Report on the AGM by Paul Delaney

The first Annual General Meeting of the Friends of The OPP Museum took place the evening of 11 June 2009 in the auditorium of OPP HQ in Orillia with more than thirty members, guests and museum staff present. The meeting was chaired by **Bruce Waite**, and **Doug Cole** acted as recording secretary. **Angie Howe** brought greetings from Commissioner **Julian Fantino**; **Dorothy Duncan** presented her President's report; and **Terry Hehn** his Treasurer's report. Three new board members, **Sandy Thomas**, **Rae Fleming** and **Patricia Bromley** were duly elected to replace retiring board members **Rod Williams**, **Paul Laing** and **Paul Delaney**.

The highlight of the evening was a fascinating and intensely personal illustrated presentation by Constable **Guy Higgott** on his three-week Commemorative Patrol, along with Constable **Eric Howells**, last February, by dogsled, snowshoe and train from Hearst to Moosonee and Moose Factory. **Paul Delaney** introduced Guy, and Angie Howe thanked him. Angie spoke about the extensive year-long OPP Centennial celebrations and encouraged all friends of The OPP Museum to take part in upcoming events. Museum Curator **Jeanie Tummon** reported on the Museum's initiatives, events and activities over the past year. She credited her excellent staff for their efforts during a particularly busy year and invited all present to visit the museum to view their new exhibit, "Frontiers: A Century of Policing".

The meeting was adjourned just before 9:00 p.m. and everyone enjoyed refreshments provided by our own renowned food historian, **Dorothy Duncan**. The delicious food, historical, though certainly not old, provided a fitting conclusion to an auspicious event.

Successful Book Sale! By Dorothy Duncan

The **Three Museums Book Sale**, co-sponsored by Friends of The OPP Museum, the Stephen Leacock Museum and the Museum of Art and History on May 23 and 24 was an unqualified success. The foundation of the sale was the donation of several hundred books by **Rosella and Grant Thompson** of Sundridge when they moved to their new home in Belleville. The Museum of Art and History hosted the event, and books flowed in from across the area to augment the Thompson donation. **Fred Addis** of the Stephen Leacock Museum, **Gloria Taylor** of the Museum of Art and History and **Rod Williams**, representing the Friends, decided that, except for the valuable antiquarian books, books would not be priced. Instead, they requested a donation to the three organizations.

On the same weekend, we celebrated **Doors Open Orillia** and our Sale attracted buyers and browsers from a wide area. When the Sale closed on Sunday afternoon, we were pleased that book sales had resulted in donations of close to \$3,000, to be divided among the three organizations. Thanks are due to many individuals and organizations: to Rod, Gloria and Fred for their hard work, to the Museum of Art and History for hosting the event, to MP **Bruce Stanton** and MPP **Garfield Dunlop** for receiving and storing the flood of donated books at their Constituency Offices, to the volunteers who staffed the Sale over the two days, and to all of you, who donated, and came to find new treasures for your collections. This first co-operative project of the three museums in Orillia proved that there is strength in numbers!

Born and raised in the Sudbury area, Staff Sergeant (Retired) **Pat Bromley** joined the OPP in 1974 as one of first twenty-five female Provincial Constables. For thirteen years she did general patrol duties in the Sudbury area, as well as a summer postings at Wasaga Beach. Promoted to Corporal, she transferred to the OPP Academy in Brampton as a Recruit Instructor. She has served as Sergeant, Operation Manager of Security at Queen's Park, Ontario Legislative Building. Later she transferred to the Records and Registration Branch, Firearms Section in Toronto. With the opening of the OPP's new headquarters, she moved to Orillia in 1995. During her last five years of service, she was seconded to the Federal Government Firearms Program.

Before and during her OPP service in Sudbury, she volunteered as a training officer with the Navy League Wrenette Corps and Royal Canadian Air Cadets, 200 Wolf Squadron. She was the Commanding Officer of the Air Cadets when transferred to Brampton. She retired from the OPP in 2004.
